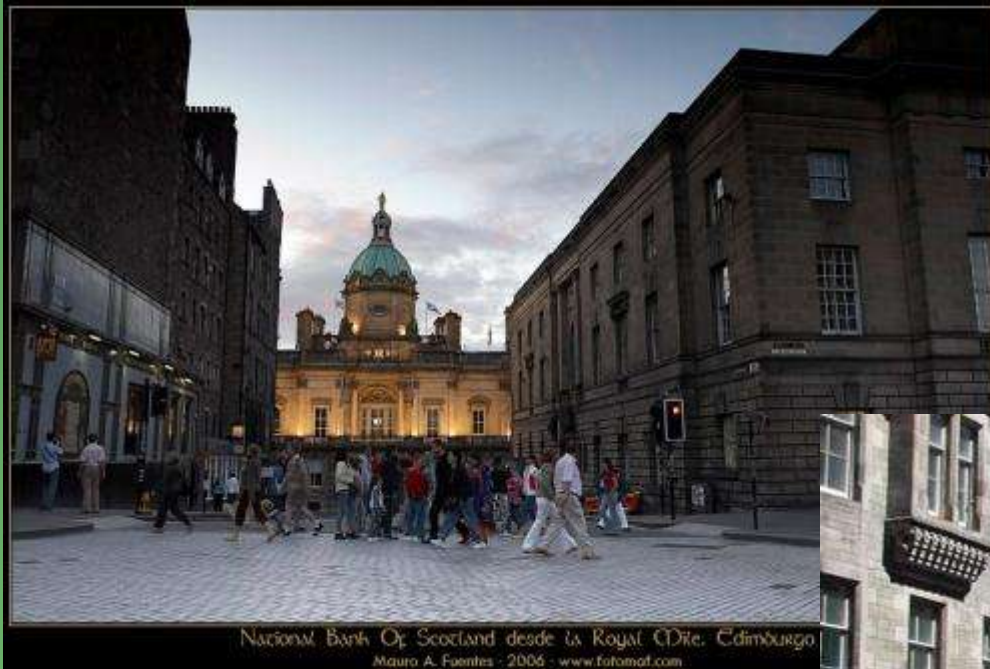

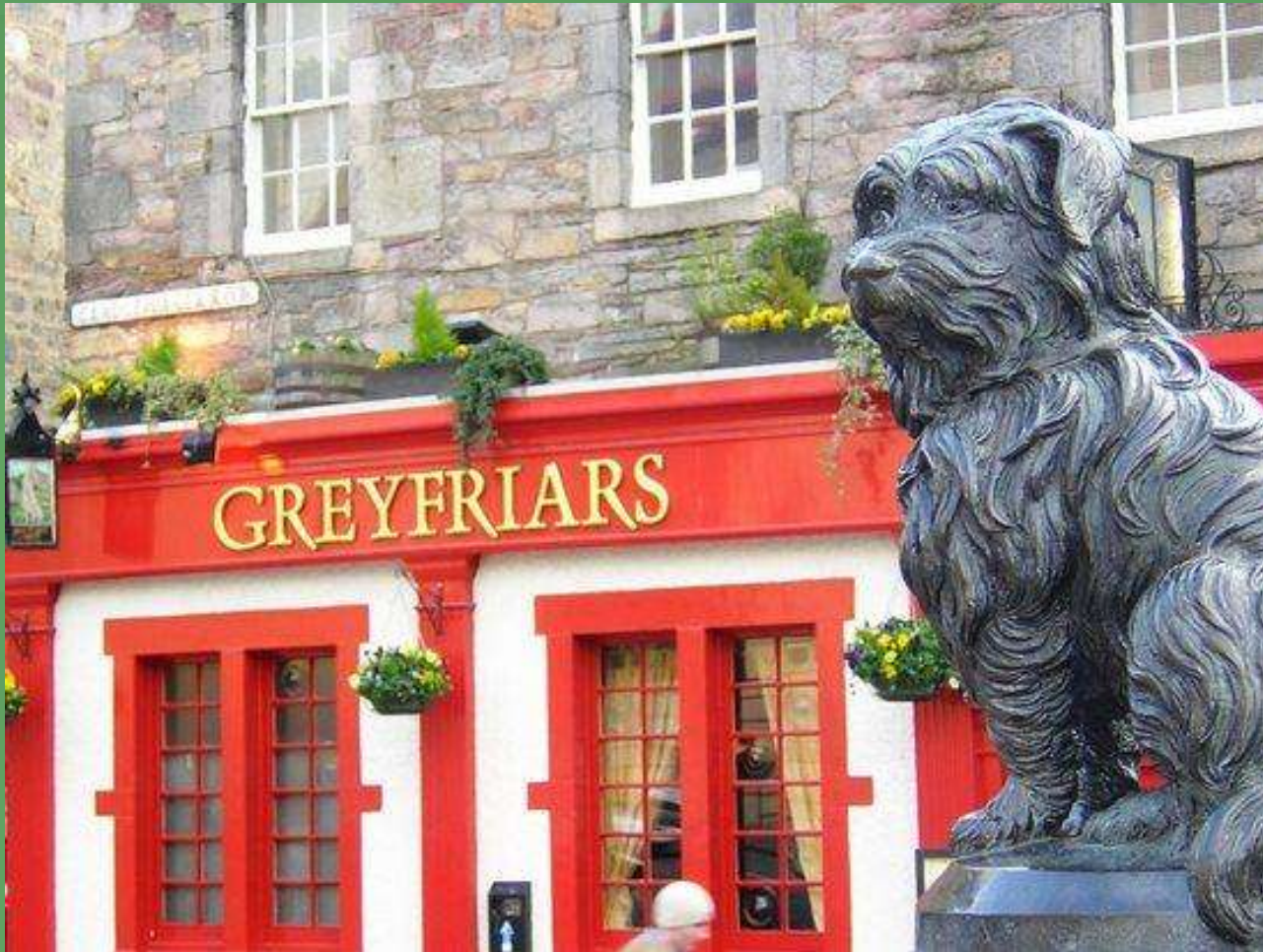

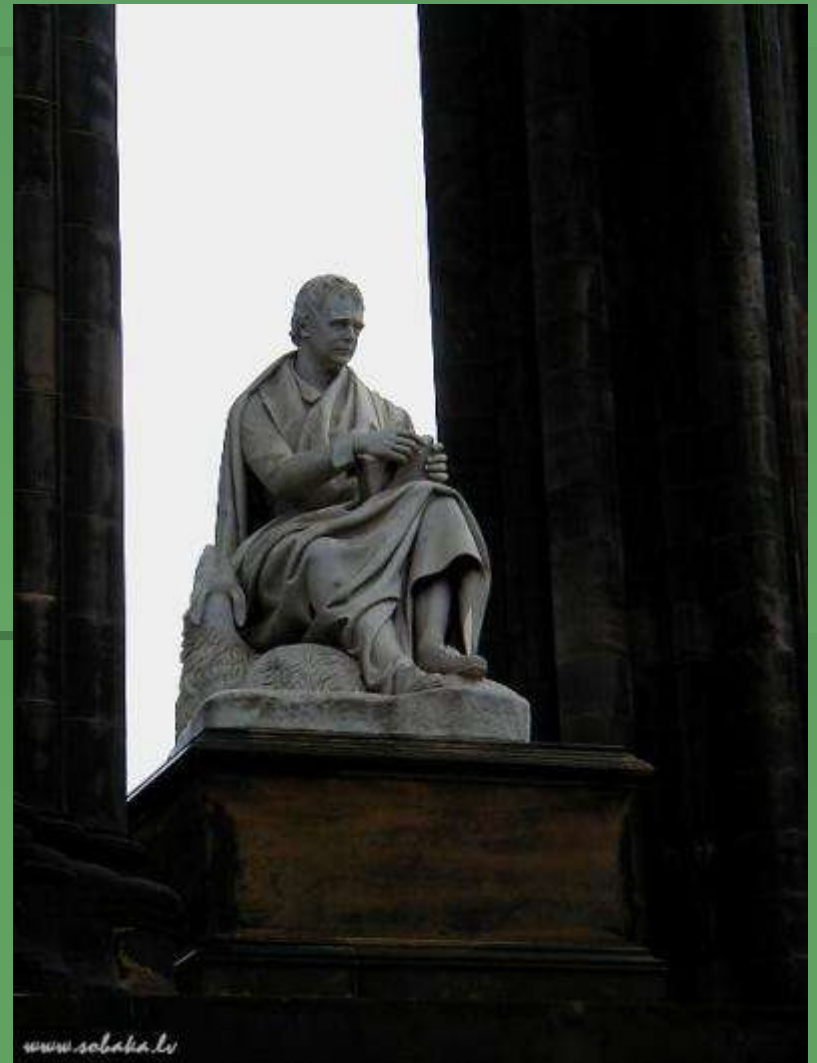

- This building stands high above Edinburgh. It looks good in any weather but at night when it is floodlit it looks just like a castle in a fairy tale.

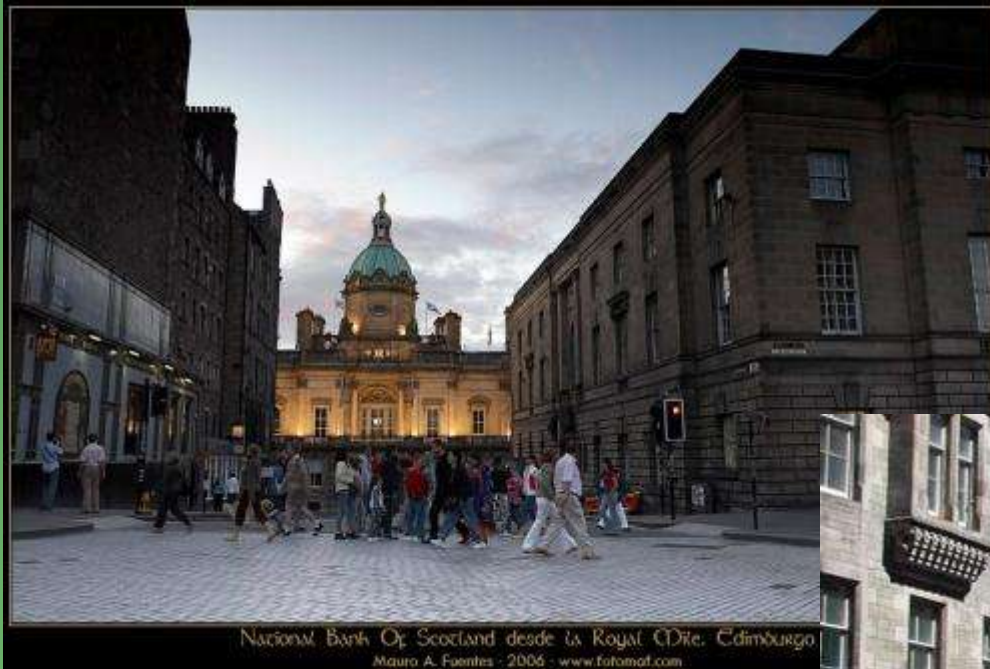

- It lies between the New Town and the Old Town and is connected with the name of the famous writer, Sir Walter Scott.

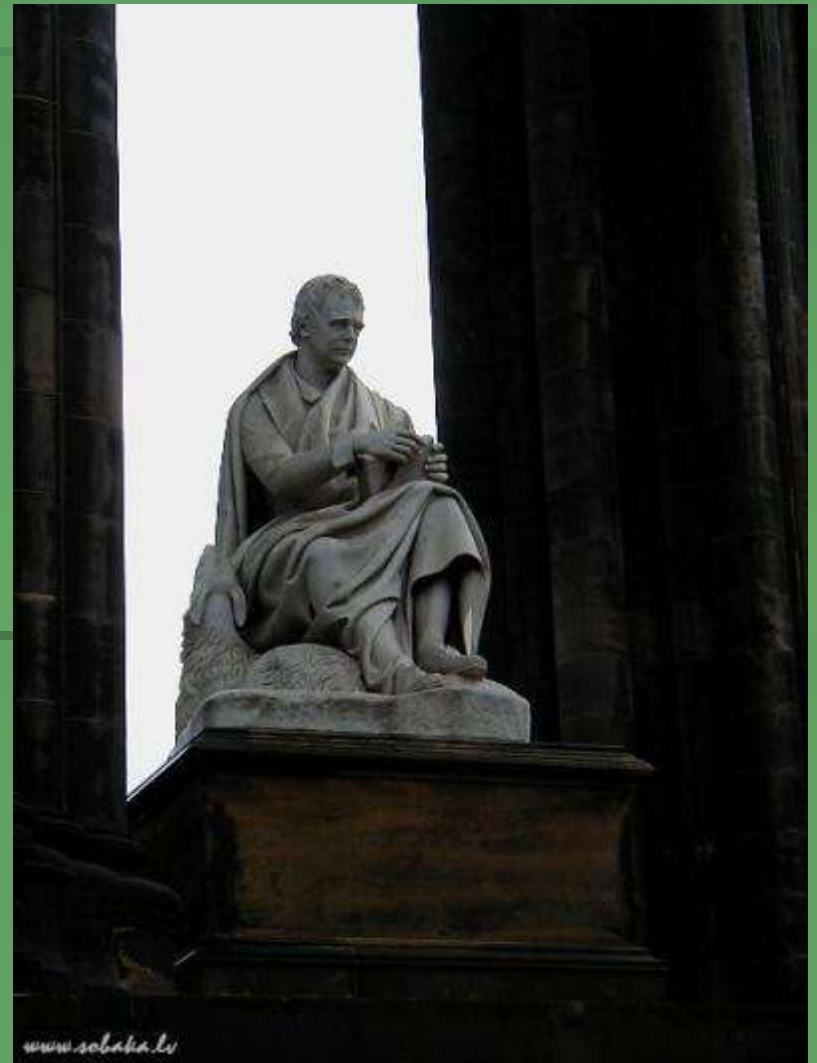
Princess Street
